

YOUNG ENTERPRISE COMPANY PROGRAMME & TEAM PROGRAMME





This year our we have a team of Additional Support Need students running a new Young Enterprise Team programme business which they have named "Image Think". Image Think were successful in the Launch of their Christmas themed Glass painting kits, and were able to sell all 25 kits between the Stranraer Academy Christmas Fair and the Millenium Centre Christmas Fair. The team are now working on a comic book that will support primary 7 pupils with the transition to secondary school. The team are currently creating their own superhero characters which will face some of the challenges and fears primary pupils may have about starting secondary school.

This year a team of 6 Senior students have launched their company "Customers & Commodities". The team has chosen to use their young enterprise business to target the cost-of-living crisis in relation to keeping warm this winter. They have been busy launching and selling their "keep warm this winter" kits, which each contain a hot water bottle to keep you warm in bed, fluffy socks to keep your feet cosy and hand made crochet ear-warmers to keep you head warm when out and about. The team have had a very successful selling period at Stranraer Academy Christmas Fair and the Millenium Centre Christmas Fair, almost fully selling out of ear-warmers and large hot water bottles. The company plan to launch a range of coasters made from recycled bottle caps in the new year, in an effort to limit waste around school and have a positive impact on the environment.



SENIOR ADDITIONAL SUPPORT NEEDS

TRANSITION EVENING

Work is currently underway in organising a Senior Additional Support Needs transition evening. Many local post school services will be visiting the school for an informal discussion with pupils, parents and guardians about post school transition and the options available beyond school. 


Students have been making excellent progress in CDT, S1 classes have been working well in filing shaping and bending acrylic photo frames, while S2 classes have taken it a step further and created their first set of wood joints in making a pine picture frame.

S3 woodwork classes have enjoyed improving their practical skills through a newly introduced Spice rack model, which they have been very excited to take home to show off their skills. S3 Graphic Communication classes have been working hard on designing packaging boxes, so that they can put expert graphic design skills to good use in the new term.

Senior woodwork and metalwork classes have been working hard on their practical course units making a wide range of products that will help prepare them for their practical assessments in the new year. Senior Graphics have also been working on a range of DTP, CAD and manual drawing techniques to build up skills for their graphics assignment.

CDT staff have been experimenting with the new Sunlu 3D printers, in preparation for incorporating the use of 3d printers in the Graphic Communications courses. S3 will be creating their own plant pot designs on CAD in the new term, see pictures for staff experiments.





A selection of initial investigation work for the Nat 5 Expressive Portfolios. Pupils are working to their personalised themes.








NPA & HIGHER QUALIFICATIONS

Myself, Sophie Irvine-Watson, Head Girl and Jack Camlin, Head Boy have been fulfilling our roles in many ways over the last two terms. We have represented the school at multiple parents' nights, ensuring everyone received a warm welcome as well as guiding parents around the building. We chair Pupil Council meetings along side our deputes and feedback to the rest of the Senior Leadership Team. At a Parent Council meeting myself and Jack provided an update of our progress providing details on our future plans as well as what we have achieved so far. We have made close relationships with the students in the pupil councils ensuring we provide an open and safe space were any questions and issues can be discussed. We have met with the Head Teacher and have discussed the school improvement plan as well as attending an online conference about the National Improvement Framework plan which allowed myself and Jack to voice our views on the education system at a national level. We consistently drive forward initiatives such as our subject specific mentoring system and aiming to provide a safe space for younger students to spend their lunch time at.





As Head Boy and Head Girl, Sophie and I, have responsibility for all five Pupil Council year groups. Year group meetings are held every month and allow for pupil voice to be central on a range of important issues; we have already covered the topics of behaviour both in and out of class, the reinstatement of registration, health and well-being, and bullying. The input we have received from each year group has allowed us to come together with the rest of the Pupil Leadership Team to work alongside the School Leadership Team to find ways to address the issues of conern to students. The impact of this can already be seen with newly established S1 toilets after SI pupils had passed on that they felt uneasy going into toilets with older students. We also have increased supervision at lunchtimes, around 20-30 Prefects and staff, to help students feel safe in the corridors. We have also had input into the S2 option form which resulted in an increased choice of subjects in one column the S2 Pupil Council had identified as a problem. These are just a few of the many changes we have made, and I am sure we will continue to make further changes throughout the school year to make all students have a better experience during their time at the school. If they are uneasy about something or think there

needs to be change somewhere,

we can make it happen.

Stranraer U18 boys progressed into the semi finals of the JH Lorraine Senior Cup with a hard fought win over Castle Douglas High School.

Both teams struggled at times due to the rough, patchy and uneven surface however it was the Stranraer boys who controlled the game from the start, enjoying large spells of possession. Many chances were created but the bobbly surface caused all sorts of problems when it came to striking the ball cleanly at goal. The breakthrough came from the ever-busy, ever tenacious Leon Paton who finished smartly to put Stranraer in the lead from an Owen Sutherland assist. Stranraer built on the pressure with Shay Meagher and Jamie McCalmont dominating the midfield. More chances were being created by Man of the Match Owen Sutherland, from clever attacking wing play on the right. Linking up with the ever busy Shay Meagher, Sutherland's dangerous drives towards the box came to fruition when he provided an inch perfect cross for Connor Duncan to finish, albeit in a very unconventional manner! Despite the obvious, lingering pain to the mid-section, Duncan shrugged it off to add a second (again assisted by Sutherland) shortly afterwards, enabling Stranraer to see out the first half with a 3 - 0 lead.

The second half saw a renewed threat from CDHS. With nothing to lose, CDHS picked up a stray ball in midfield and fired a speculative effort from range, which made it just inside the post to catch Stranraer unaware. CDHS did not trouble much after this, as Stranraer pressed on to create chances. Some good hold up play from Jamie McIntyre caused havoc around the box, but again the resulting Stranraer efforts were fired wide or high. Stranraer got closer with a spectacular 30 yard, left footed volley from Leon Paton, which caused the goalkeeper a lot of trouble, but ultimately did not cross the line. A foray forward from left by the impressive Ally Hilferty saw him score an absolute stunner from 25 yards, where he struck it cleanly into the top corner to go 4-1 up. With CDHS sitting deeper to soak up the pressure, the waves of Stranraer attacks still could not find the goal, despite shots from James Forbes, Alfie Whorlow and Shay Meagher going close. CDHS then made the most of a long ball breakaway against the run of play, taking advantage of defensive confusion to score their second goal with 5 minutes remaining. With the score line now 4 - 2 and full time near, Stranraer kept the ball and made sure to see the game out without any further mistakes to book their place in the semi-final of the Senior Cup where they will meet either Wallace Hall Academy or St Joseph's College. 










Match Report by Mr David G. Harvey





2022 UK FORENSIC SCIENCE YOUTH SUMMIT

On the 2nd of November. Some 5/6 years took part in the 2022 UK Forensic Science Youth Summit hosted by the Royal Institution. We got to listen to people like Professor Dame Sue Black and Dr James Gooch. We also talked about the criminal justice system and the different courts and verdicts that can be made. Towards the end of the summit, we discussed 3 cases.

One of the cases was a murder of a flat mate in Italy. The case was weird with DNA found on the victim of the other flat mates' boyfriend. The flat mate, her boyfriend and her boss were jailed for 4 years before the real murderer was found. They were trialled 3 times before the other suspect convicted of the murder went to jail. We discussed what we thought about the cases in a live chat with forensic scientists and moderators who would ask questions and reply to our comments on things we thought had happened. Overall, we learned a lot of valuable information and it was definitely worth it.
