Meanwhile in S3 the students have been producing some super Expressive work.











POLAR ACADEMY

WHAT IS THE POLAR ACADEMY ALL ABOUT?

THE ADVENTURE OF A LIFETIME

The Polar Academy is a charity – set up in 2012 – which identifies a certain type of young adult in Scottish schools and organizations, those who are often overlooked by the education system. The polar academy team trains them over a year and takes them on a truly unbelievable polar expedition. The idea is to change these pupils outlook on life, coming back very different people to who they were when they start the programme 12 months earlier. After they return, they travel around other schools to inspire and motivate their peers.





THIS SO IMPORTANT?

The initial concept for the Polar Academy was never just about the ten pupils... And there was no way 20,000 of Scotland's teenagers could go! So the ten would have to do something so difficult and so challenging that 20,000 people would sit there and think, 'that's incredible'. Now, one of our 15-year-old girls can go into a room with 400 strangers and have them totally silent for an hour, in awe of what she's done. The pupils who hear her story think, 'She lives down the road from me. I've known her for years. If she can do that, I can do anything.' That's what the Polar Academy's about. It's not just about the ten pupils, it's about what the ten do when they come back home.





Our Polar Academy pupils: Abbie Arkless, Eloise Moulton Lewis Ryder,Innes Lockhart,Adam Akenhead, Amber Hannah Courtney Atkin, Gabriella Teears,Ed Woonton and Isla Clements completed their expedition and had an experience that will be with them for a lifetime. They returned home with more confidence and a special bond amongst their peers.

They will now tour other schools to motivate pupils with tales of excitement and adventure. We could not be more proud of what they have accomplished.


Senior Pupils in the Learning Centre


SCOTTISH BACCALAUREATE SUCCESS

DEVELOPING THE YOUNG WORKFORCE




BATTLEFIELDS 2022


After two difficult years when we have had to cancel our trip, it was great to see the return of the Battlefields Trip this year. This is our eleventh trip, with students from S3 travelling to Belgium on a seven day study tour to the Western front battlefields to explore and develop a better understanding of the soldier's experiences and conditions during World War One. Based in the Flemish town of Ypres we took time to pay our respects at one of the most enduring commemorative ceremonies in the world – The Last Post at the Menin Gate.

A group of 45 students travelled on the trip accompanied by five teaching staff, Mr Lane, Miss Moffat, Mr Halliday, Miss Grierson and Miss Burgess. An early Saturday morning departure saw the group catch the evening ferry from Newcastle to Amsterdam. Sightseeing began the very first day with visits to the impressive Cloth Hall in the centre of Ypres, and the immersive 'In Flanders Field' Museum an interactive interpretive centre that seeks to tell from the stories of the war through the experiences of the everyday person, soldier and citizen alike.

STRANRAER ACADEMY TRIP TO BATTLEFIELDS 2022



On Monday we explored the local area of Ypres, using local transport to travel out to the monumental, and moving, Tyne Cot War Graves, the largest Commonwealth cemetery with over 12000 internments. We also explored the underground bunkers and trenches at the Passchendaele 1917 Museum in Zonnebecke. On the Tuesday the emphasis was on the battles of the war, so another early start saw the trip head south into France to the Somme where visits were made to Thiepval Memorial, Lochnagar Crater, as well as the very modern Sir John Monash Centre at the Australian National War Memorial. We also took a great glass elevator descending beneath the town of Arras into the Quarries used as staging places for an attack on the German lines. A truly amazing day. Wednesday saw a shift in focus to that of 'sacrifice' and loss with a return to the Ypres Salient area, exploring the WWI hospital sites, and being confronted by the German mass graves at Langemark, the site of the first use of poison gas, and also the internment of 25,000 German soldiers into a single grave.

The students took the opportunity to visit the Scottish Memorial in Zonnebeck, near Paschendaele, with the class holding a minutes silence and laying a wreath on behalf of the school.

Without doubt the most moving part of the trip was the visit to the Menin Gate and the Last Post ceremony, which has run almost continuously since 1928, as a show of respect held by the Belgians for the sacrifice made by the soldiers of the British Commonwealth. At exactly 8pm, every night, all traffic is stopped from travelling through the gate, buglers from the Last Post Association sound their tribute, and a minutes silence is observed. Hundreds attend each night. Students Georgina Lane and Adam Ferguson officially participated in the ceremony, laying a second wreath on behalf of the school for the day. As the wreaths were laid, the whole crowd stands in silence, a truly moving experience. Despite it being short ceremony, all the students reported how moving they found the ceremony; some shed a tear at the culmination of three very insightful, but emotional days.

We also had some down time, and a chance to relax, with a free time visit to the beautiful and historic city of Bruges, as well as a day at a theme park, with all the associated thrills and spills.

The students were exceptionally well behaved, respectful, and responsible. They were a credit to their families and great ambassadors for their community and school. Both staff and students thoroughly enjoyed the trip, and the school is already well under way preparing next year's visit.













