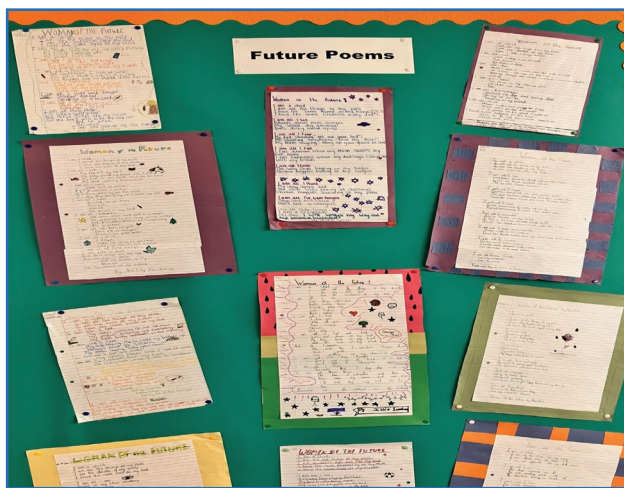
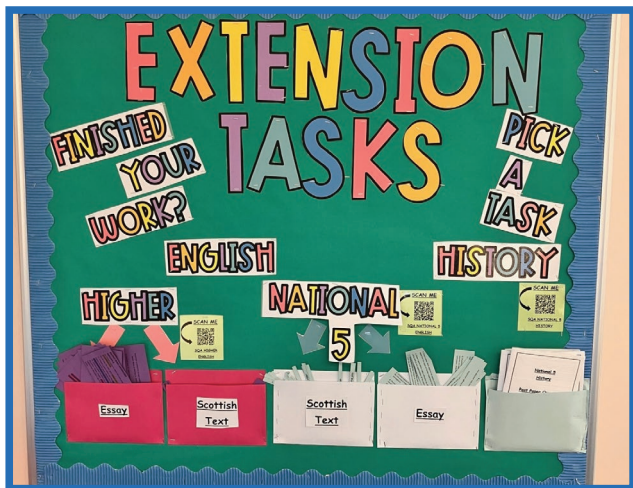
Developing the Young Workforce

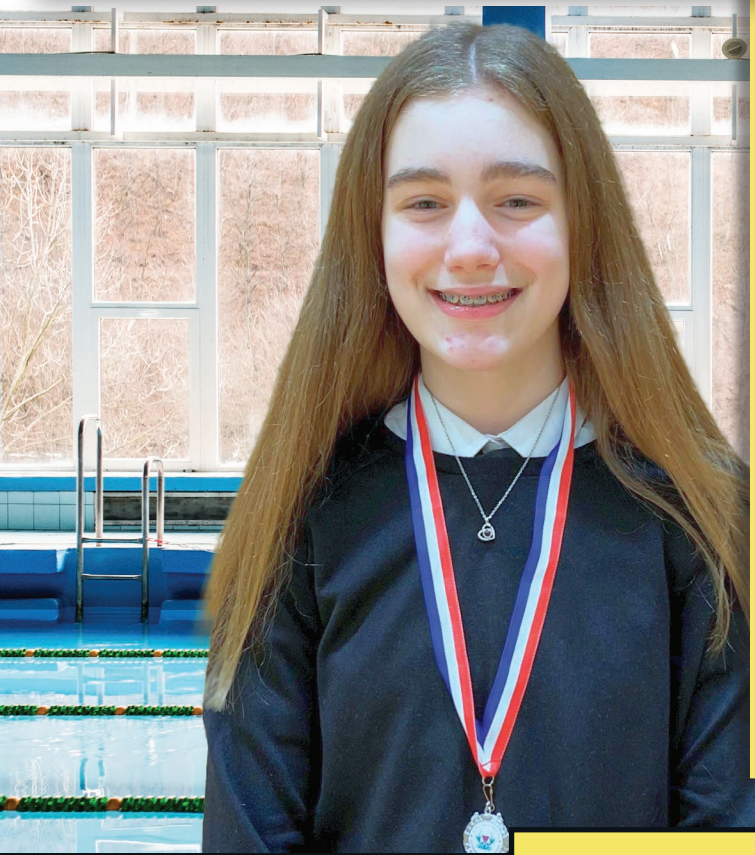

Once again, congratulations to Molly for her exceptional performance!

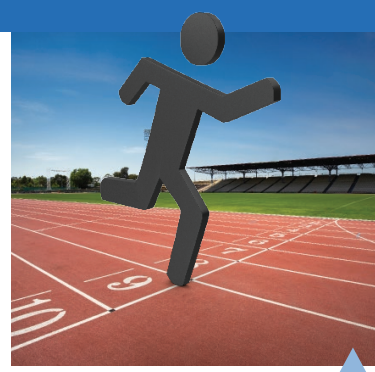


Annual Athletics Pentathlon Championship

Stranraer Stage Thrilling Comeback to Win 3-2 in Final

In a captivating final, Stranraer showcased their resilience by overturning a 1-0 deficit at halftime to secure a thrilling 3-2 victory. The first half was evenly contested, with Stranraer displaying superior attacking possession. However, it was Dumfries High School who managed to find the back of the net just 30 seconds before the break.

Similar to the semi-final, Stranraer had to regroup during halftime. Five minutes into the second half, Nathan Lockwood seized the ball from a defender on the left-hand side. He swiftly delivered a low cross that Aeron Baxter skillfully reached ahead of the Dumfries goalkeeper, leveling the scoreline at 1-1.

With their spirits lifted and increased control of the ball, Stranraer took the lead for the first time in the game seven minutes later when Finn McLean unleashed a powerful long-range shot. Stranraer continued to dominate possession and create promising opportunities. However, with nine minutes remaining, Dumfries managed to equalize with a well-executed breakaway goal, setting the score at 2-2.

The game hung in the balance at this point, but with just five minutes left on the clock, Ruben Harker played a remarkable long-range ball over the defense, finding Aeron's path. Aeron collected the ball just inside the box, took a composed touch, and calmly slotted it past the keeper. Stranraer regained the lead at 3-2, and they managed to see out the remaining minutes.

The boys delivered a fantastic performance throughout the match, demonstrating their resilience and determination. Congratulations to all involved on a well-deserved victory!

Stranraer S1 Students Triumphant



On the memorable day of Wednesday, May 3rd, the S1 students from Stranraer Academy showcased their football skills in the inaugural Stuart Binnie and James Hannay memorial tournament held at Palmerston Park in Dumfries. Mr. Binnie and Mr. Hannay were revered figures in schools football, and this tournament served as a poignant tribute to their unwavering dedication and support for the sport in Dumfries & Galloway. In honor of their contributions, the tournament featured the Mr. Binnie Large Schools Trophy and the Mr. Hannay Small Schools Trophy.

The 7-a-side tournament included all schools from the region, with two teams representing Stranraer Academy, comprising a total of 18 talented boys and girls. Each team competed in a group of nine, engaging in a round-robin format where they faced every school in their respective group. One of the teams achieved a record of 2 wins, 2 draws, and 4 defeats, securing a respectable mid-table position but falling short of reaching the finals.

However, the other Stranraer team concluded the tournament with an impressive record of 5 wins and 3 draws, emerging as group winners and progressing to the semi-finals. In a highly anticipated local derby, they faced Douglas Ewart H.S. and displayed a magnificent performance, triumphing with a resounding 3-0 victory. In the final, they squared off against Dalbeattie High School, a team that had conceded very few goals throughout the tournament and won all but one of their matches. Stranraer knew they faced a tough challenge, and the game ended in a draw despite numerous chances at both ends. The tournament outcome was determined by a penalty shootout, with Dalbeattie emerging as victors on this occasion. Stranraer gave their all, with two of their three penalties narrowly missing the mark, showcasing their tremendous effort and skill in their strikes.

As Stranraer Academy was categorised as a large school and Dalbeattie as a small school, both teams received a well-deserved trophy, symbolising their achievements.

After an exhilarating day of football, Stranraer Academy returned westward along the A75, proudly bearing the Stuart Binnie trophy as the inaugural winners—an incredibly fitting tribute under the circumstances.

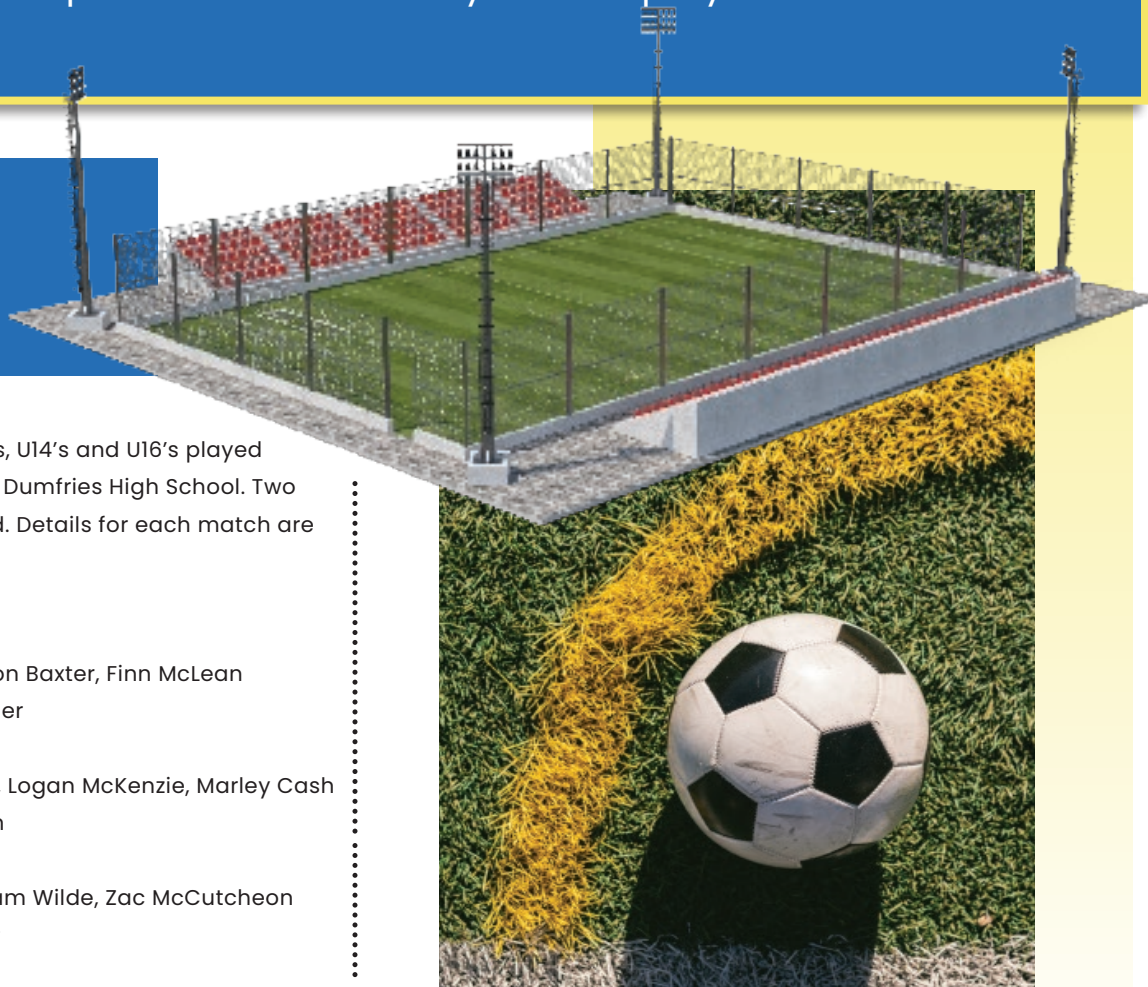

In the handicap section, the top performers based on stableford scoring were:

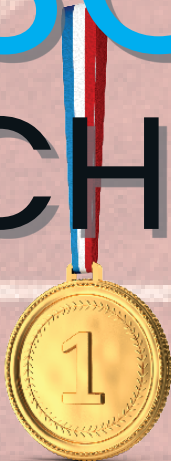

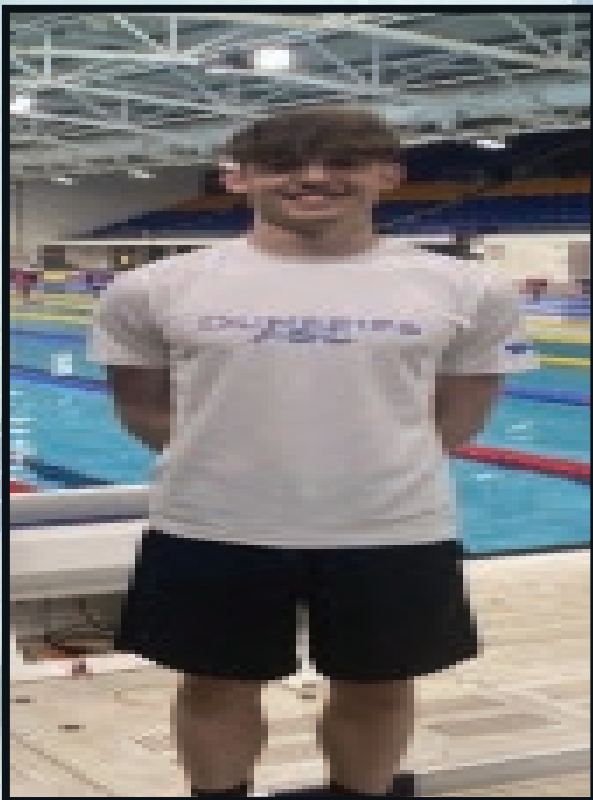


Finlay Nelson and Millie Colvin Make Waves at Glasgow International Swim Meet

At Stranraer Academy students learn in a variety of settings, using a variety of learning approaches. In session 203/24 young people who learn within the school's Learning Centre will have a new approach to learning.

The learning Centre class has been rebranded by the students as Team GT3, we have consulted an Occupational Therapy Company to improve the learning environment, to better meet the needs of the learners. This work will be carried out within the holidays.

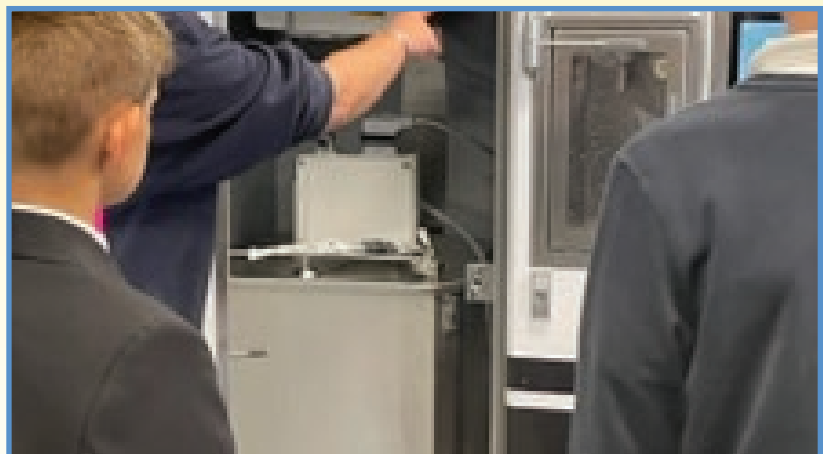
The curriculum is also being developed, in consultation with our school Educational Psychologist. This curriculum will be based on experiential learning. Experiential learning Theory was proposed by David Kolb in 1984. It is based on learning through doing.

The GT3 team will be learning and doing. This has begun with their enterprise activity "The Wee Aird Milk Service" pupils have worked during May and June to set up a service to staff, whereby staff order milk through the team, pay and the pupils collect and deliver the milk.

The pupils have used literacy skills to email staff, used ICT skills to set up electronic forms, used Maths to calculate the costings and used listening and talking skills to collect money from staff. In addition they carried out their own risk assessment of the service.

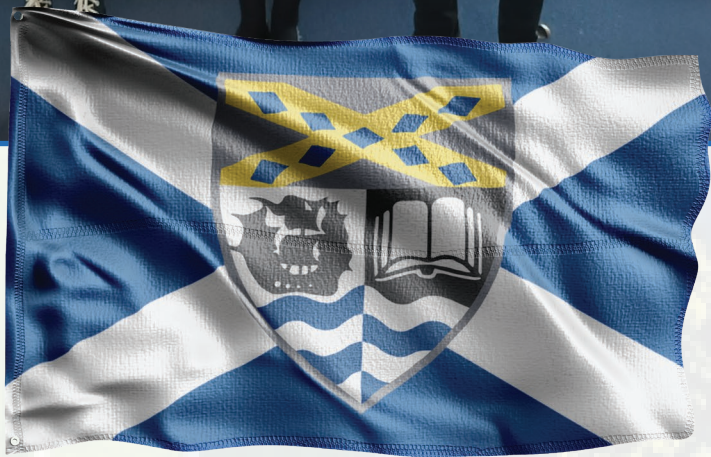
On Tuesday 20th the class visited the farm to learn more about the process. This was an important part of Farm to Fork fortnight. They saw all aspects of farming, the pasteurization process and even inside the milk vending machine.

Pupils will also be taking part in learning for sustainability project. In a joint initiative with the Incredible Edibles team at the community garden from August to October. We have visited the garden for the first time this and the pupils went straight to work harvesting new potatoes and broad beans.

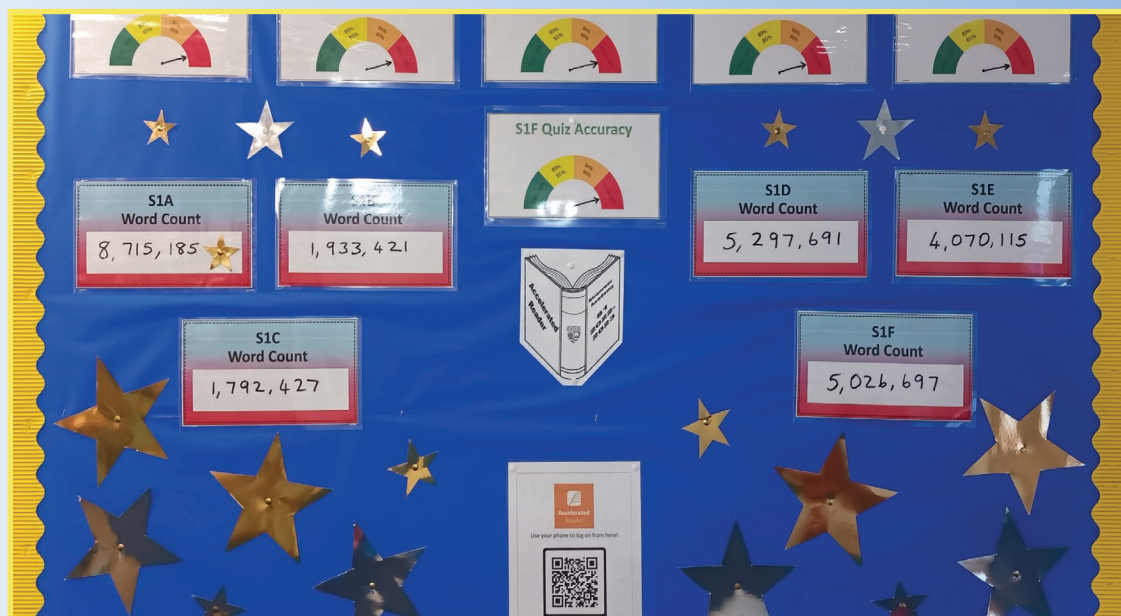
Analysis of this session's Accelerated Reader results demonstrates that most pupils made progress with their reading levels, especially those who read regularly. However, overall quiz accuracy is down on previous years. We have created a display in the Languages and Communication Base to encourage more pupils to not only read regularly, but to read with care so their quiz answers are as accurate as possible.

How can I help my child with their reading?

Encourage your child/ward to read regularly for short periods of time; 20 minutes five nights a week is a great start. This should be from a book within their AR Book Level, and should be done with no digital distractions. When time is up, ask them what they are enjoying about their reading, who their favourite character is in the book, or if they have learned anything from it. If they are struggling to remember details, encourage them to write a brief summary of each chapter or section – this will also help them when they take the quiz at the end of the book.

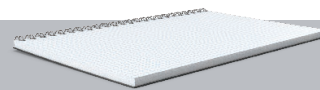

TRANSITION

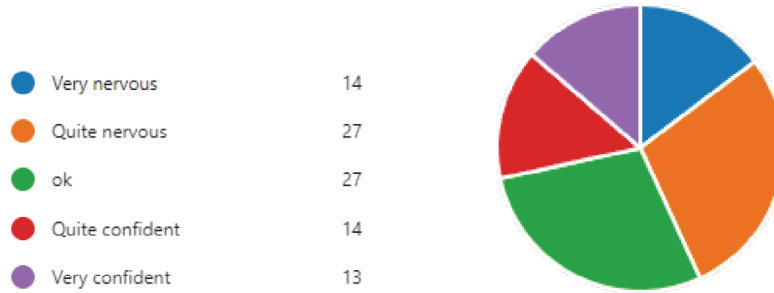

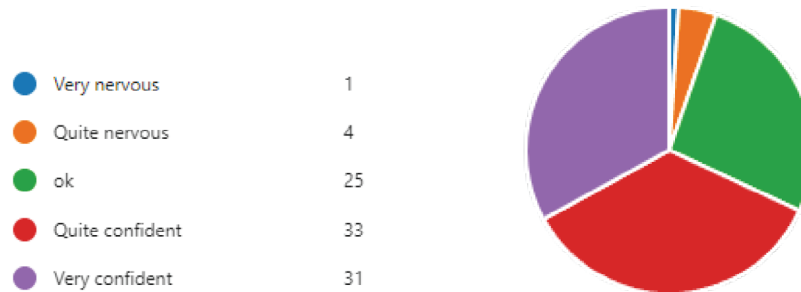




How nervous were you before the transition program?

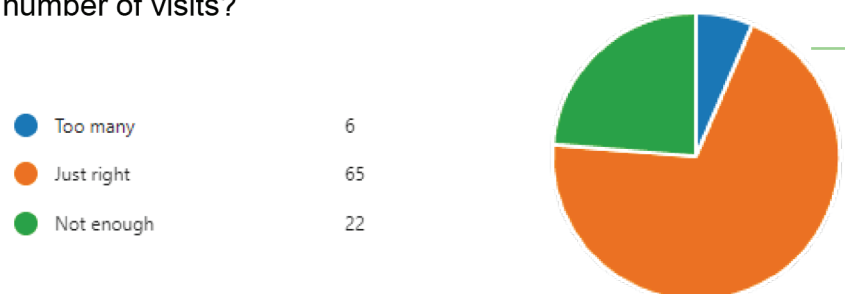

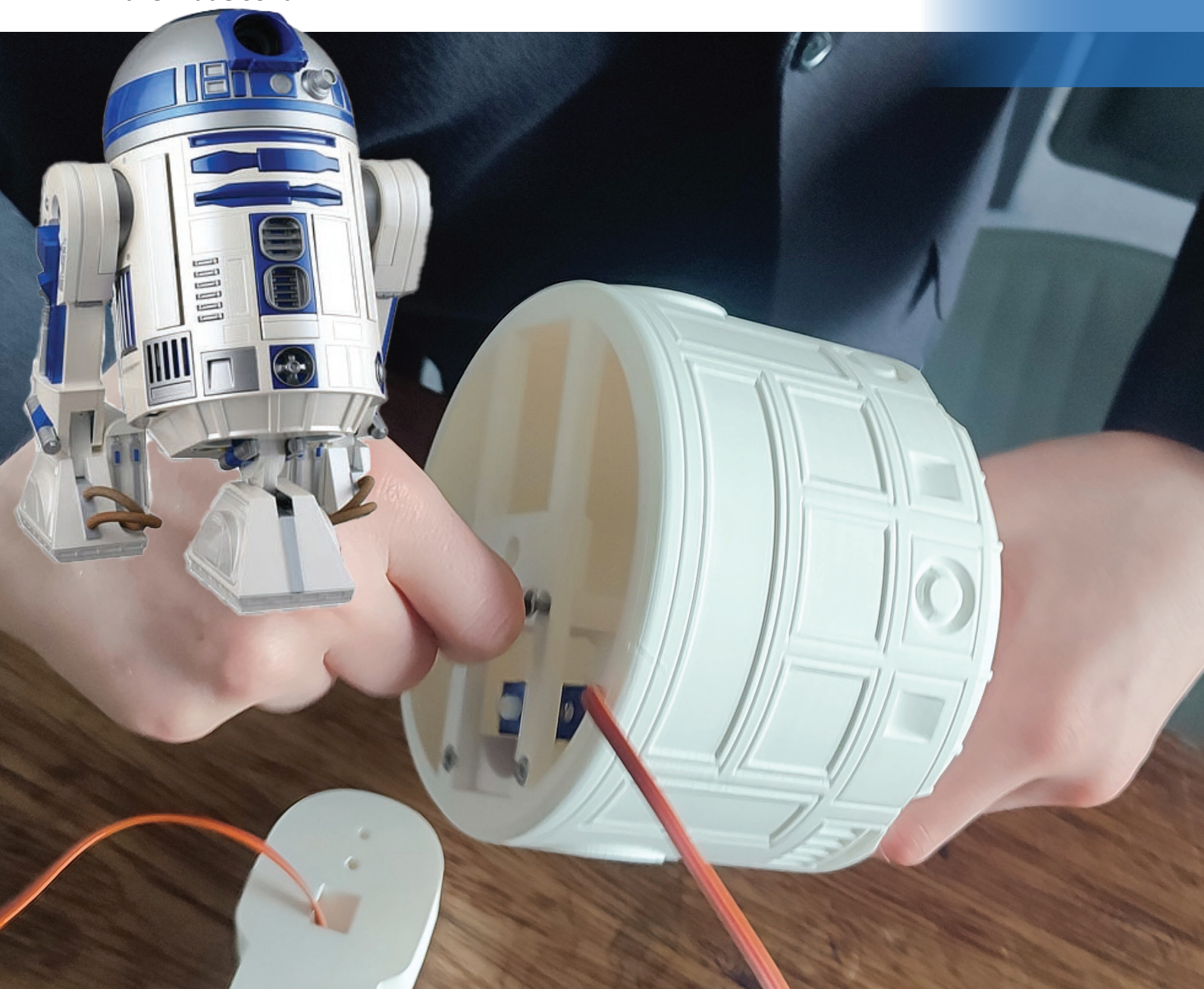

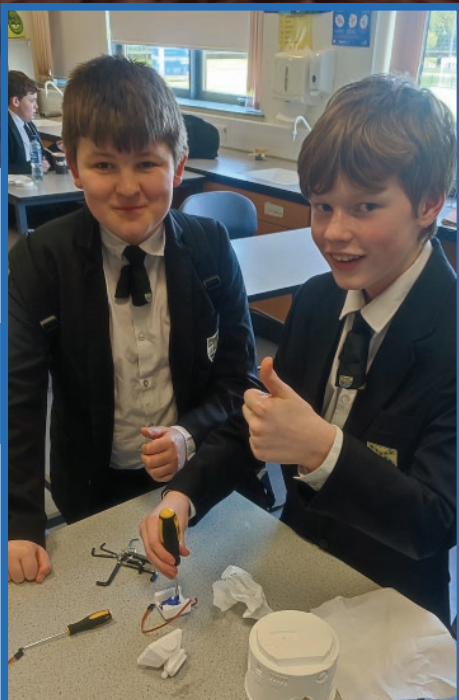

- advantage** → we know when the tides will happen so we will know when electricity will be produced.
- disadvantage** → the tides only happen twice a day.

HYDRO-ELECTRIC.

- advantage** → water is free.
- disadvantage** → the dam is expensive.

SOLAR.

- advantage** → the sun's energy is free.
- disadvantage** → some people don't like the look of solar panels.

Energy Sources:

Biomass. Biomass uses the energy from plants and waste materials to make electricity.

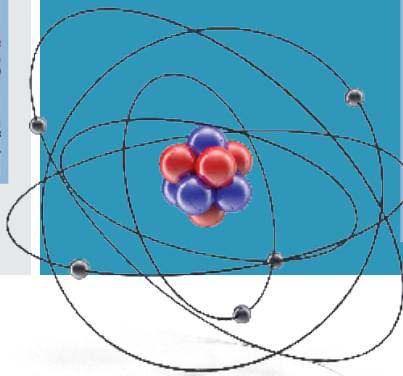
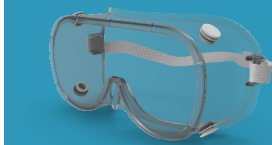
Geothermal. Geothermal power uses the heat from the under surface of the Earth. The temperature of the Earth increases towards its centre. The hot water or steam within our planet can be used to make electricity.

Tidal. Tidal energy comes from the movement of the water in the sea. The flow of water that is created by the tides is used to turn generators that make electricity.

Hydro-electric. Hydro-electric power is generated from water. Dams are built across a valley to trap the water. The water can then be used to turn turbines to make electricity.

Wave. Wave power uses the energy of the waves to turn turbines to make electricity.

Solar. Solar panels use photovoltaic cells to convert the energy from the sun into electricity.

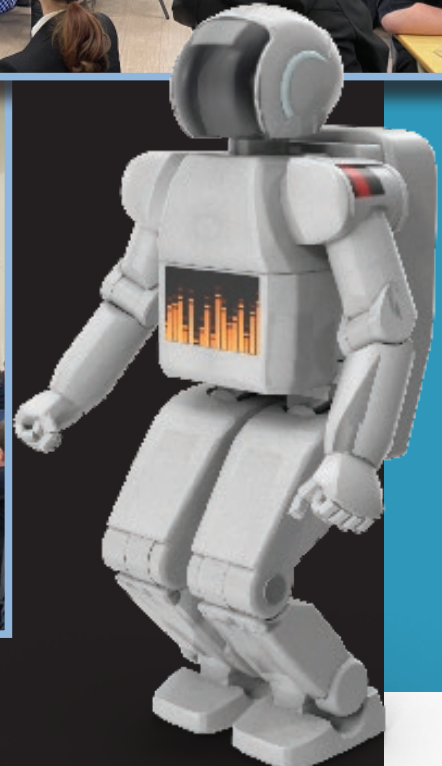


INDUSTRIAL CADETS CHALLENGER EXPERIENCE

We soon journeyed back to the hostel and enjoyed free time before dinner at the same restaurant as the previous night, then bed. Tuesday morning started at the lively hour of 4 am when the fire alarm blasted through the halls. The mood was low but brightened when seeing Mr Lane in Lilo and Stitch pajamas. On this day we travelled to the land of the famous Battle of Somme. Our first destination was the Australian National Memorial - much to Mr Lane's sombre delight - located on the grounds of the Villers - Bretonneux Military Cemetery.

The Women's Memorial is also situated here and is a small but meaningful way to remember the nurses lost in the conflict. We then stopped for lunch in a small town called Albert where we enjoyed traditional French delights. Thiépval memorial was the next stop where Olivia Stewart and Finlay Scott, who had found the graves of their relatives, laid a wreath. The last stop was Wellington Quarry where the minors of The Tunneller's of New Zealand Division dug quarries for the British to advance upon the Germans from underground. Takeaway Domino's pizza was on the menu that night when we got back to the hostel - 22 carried back by our very own advance party of 4 pupils. First stop on Wednesday was Lijssenthoek Commonwealth Cemetery where we were tasked in finding someone with our surname and to draw their grave. We then headed to Langemarck Cemetery containing the graves of 44,000 German soldiers. Then it was time to journey to the bustling city of Bruges, enjoying a full day of shopping and

sightseeing. Thursday was the final day and was enjoyed at Bellewaerde theme park where we spent the best part of 7 hours on rides. This was followed by a short trip to McDonald's and a never ending 15 hour road trip across the sea and up through Englandshire before returning to Stranraer Academy at 8am on Friday morning. We were exhausted and exhilarated following our sociable and educational week, and would like to thank everyone who made this fantastic trip possible.

Remembering Sacrifice:

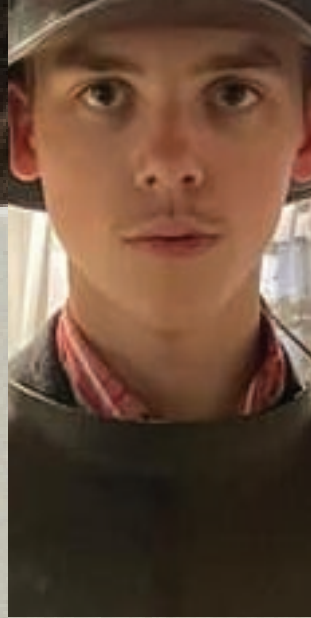
