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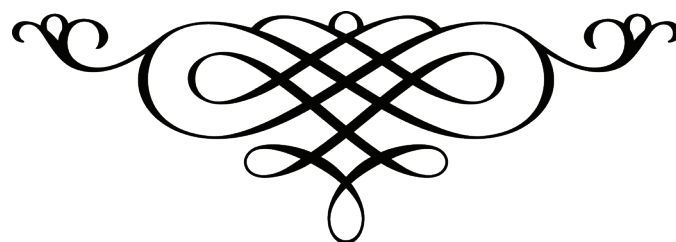

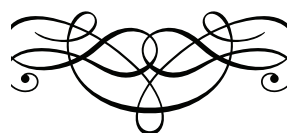
The pupils sold their hand made items in the school street and at the Parent Council Christmas Fayre. They made the incredible amount of £110.

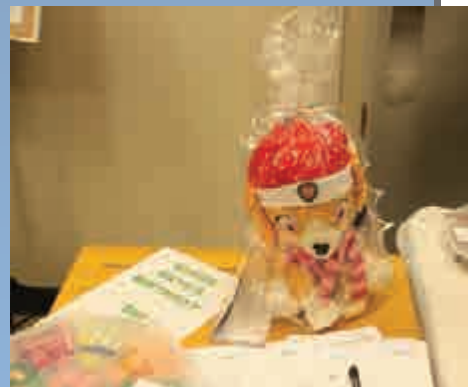

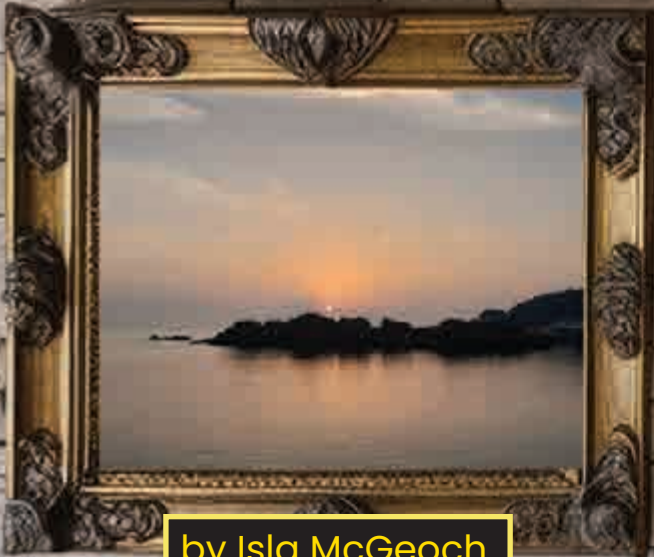

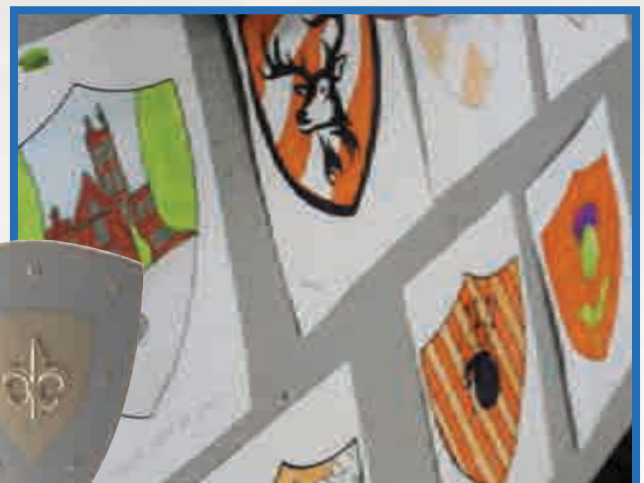

Robert Nelson: Gold in 25m front crawl and Silver in 25m backstroke.

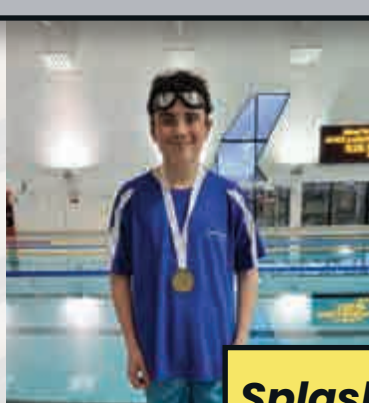
Nathan McKie: Gold in 50m front crawl.

Sarah McClymont: Earned Silver in 100m Freestyle.

Lily McClymont: Displayed excellence with a Silver in 100m Butterfly.

George Zbiegniewski: Exhibited skill with Gold in 100m Breaststroke, Gold in 200m Individual Medley, Silver in 100m Butterfly, and Bronze in 200m Freestyle.

Millie Colvin: Impressed with Gold in 100m Butterfly, Gold in 200m Butterfly, Silver in 100m Freestyle, and Silver in 200m Freestyle.

Molly Irvine-Watson: Set a new Regional Record with Gold in 100m Freestyle and achieved Gold in 200m Freestyle, 100m Breaststroke, and 200m Breaststroke.

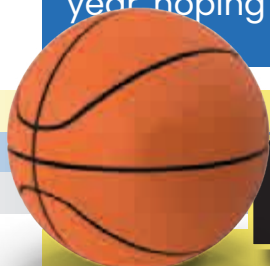


Netball League Update

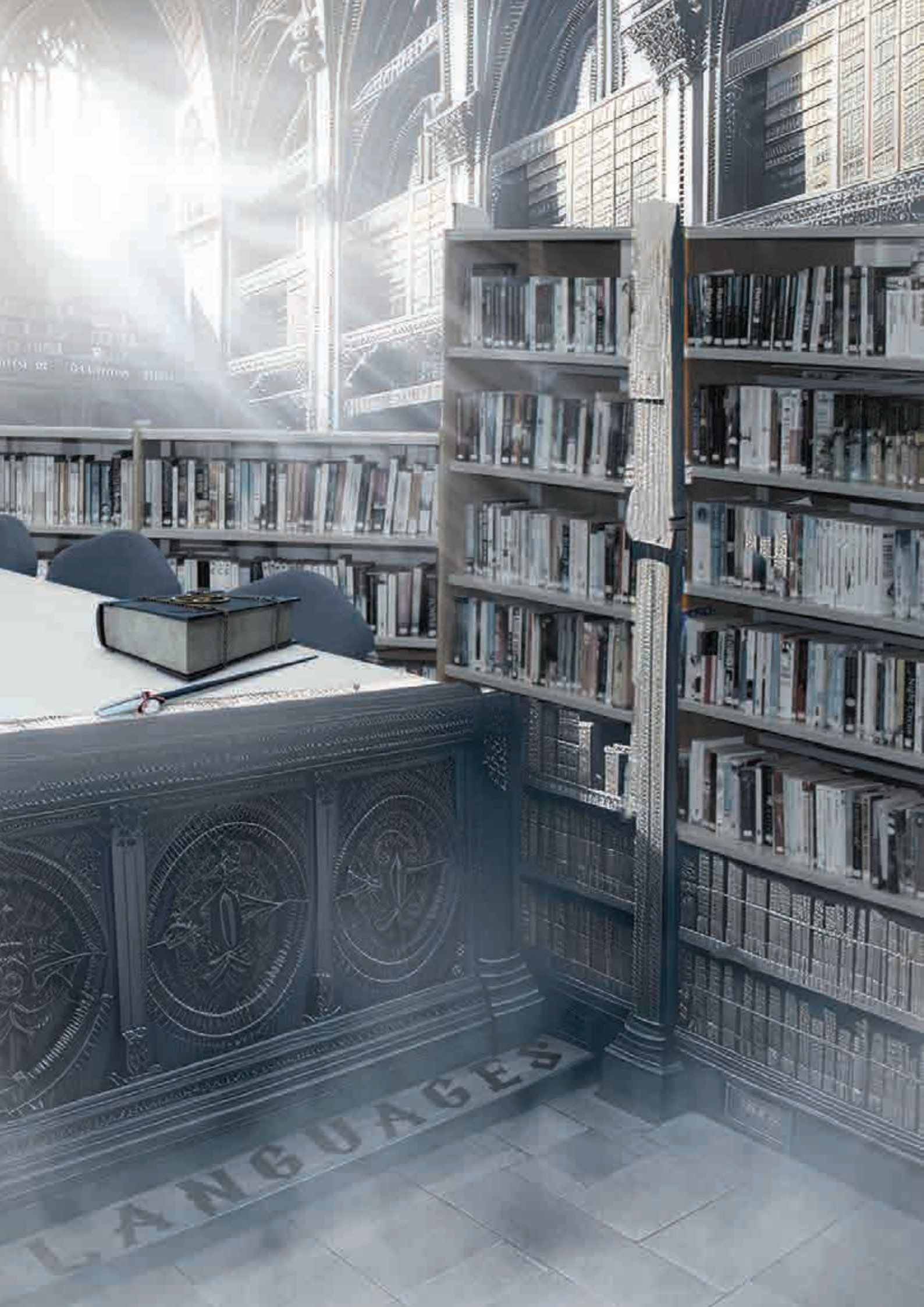
HOME ECONOMICS:

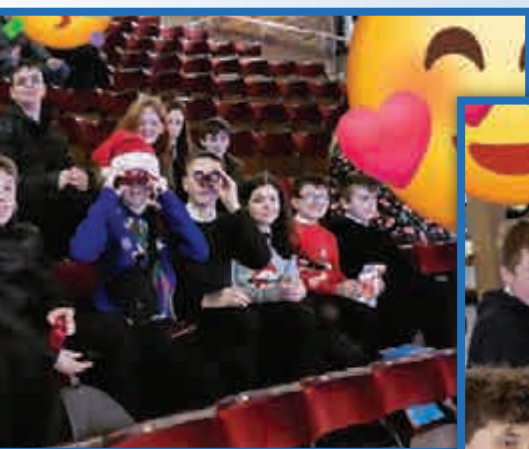


ACCELERATED READING CELEBRATION RESULTS

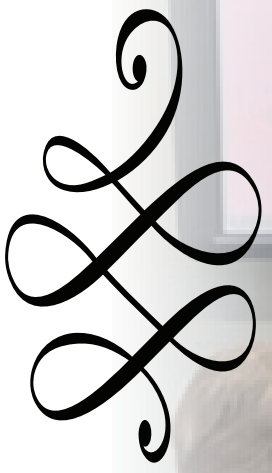
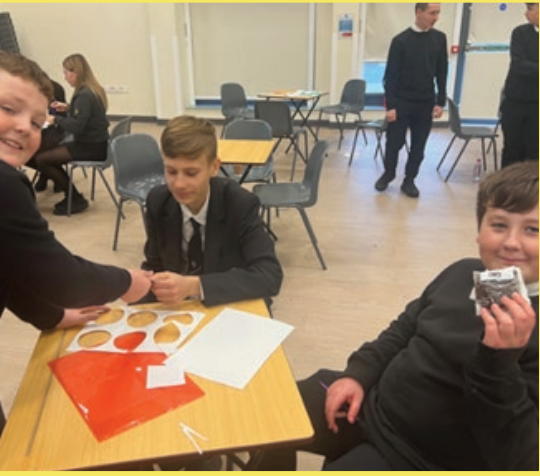
Real-World Problem-Solving

This term for S1, Logan came out on top and Dunskey were second, for S2, Glenapp were the winners followed by Inch.



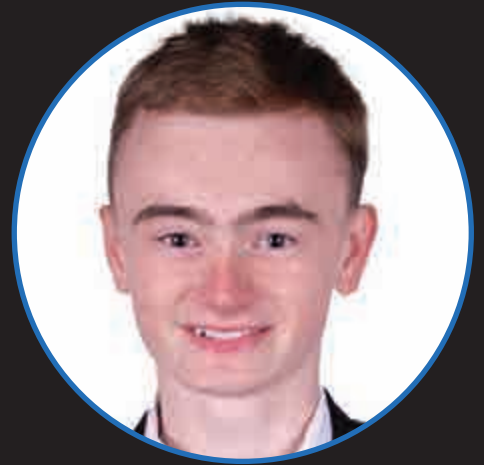

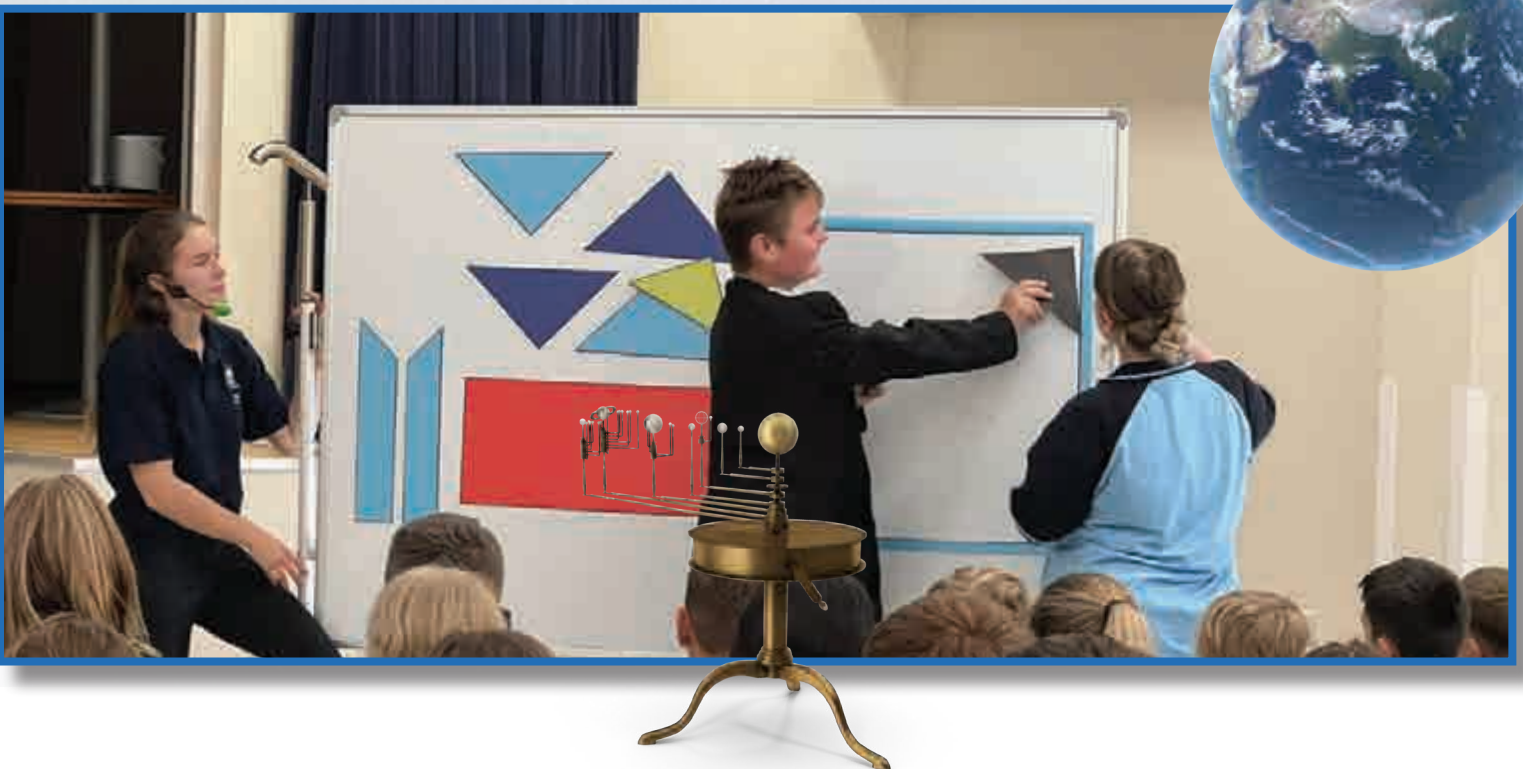

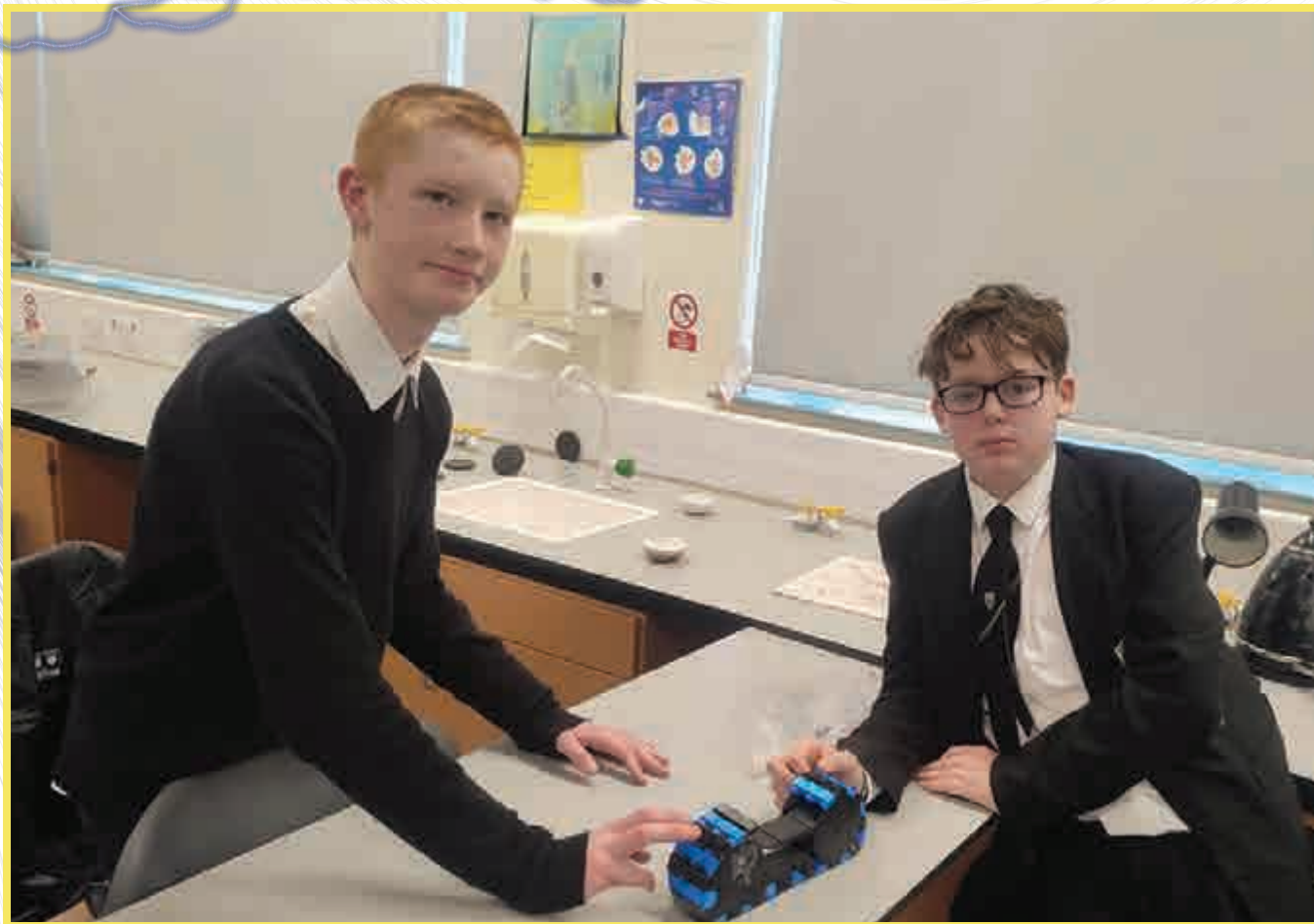

MECH MAESTROS LUNCHEON LEAGUE

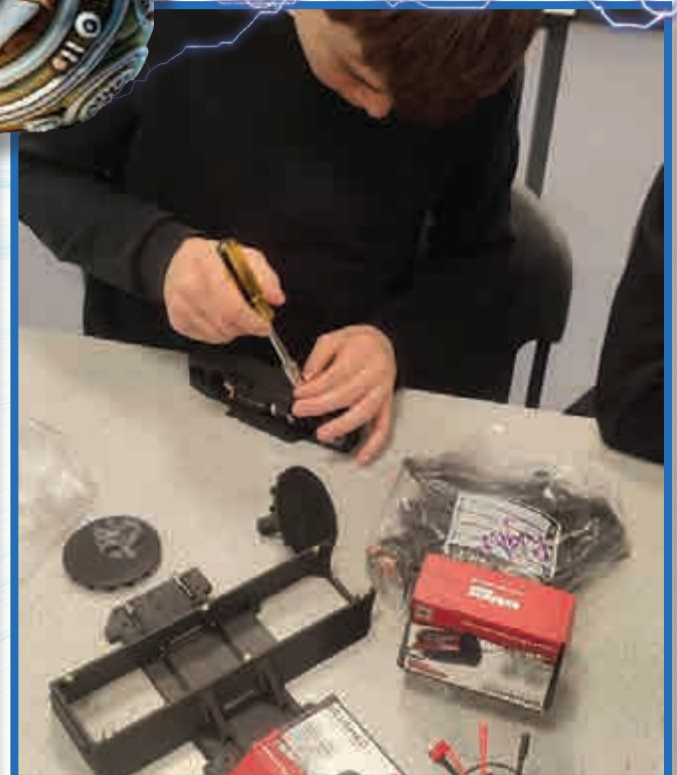

SOCIAL SUBJECTS FACULTY'S NEW AWARD SYSTEM UNVEILED

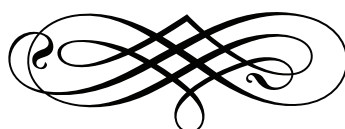

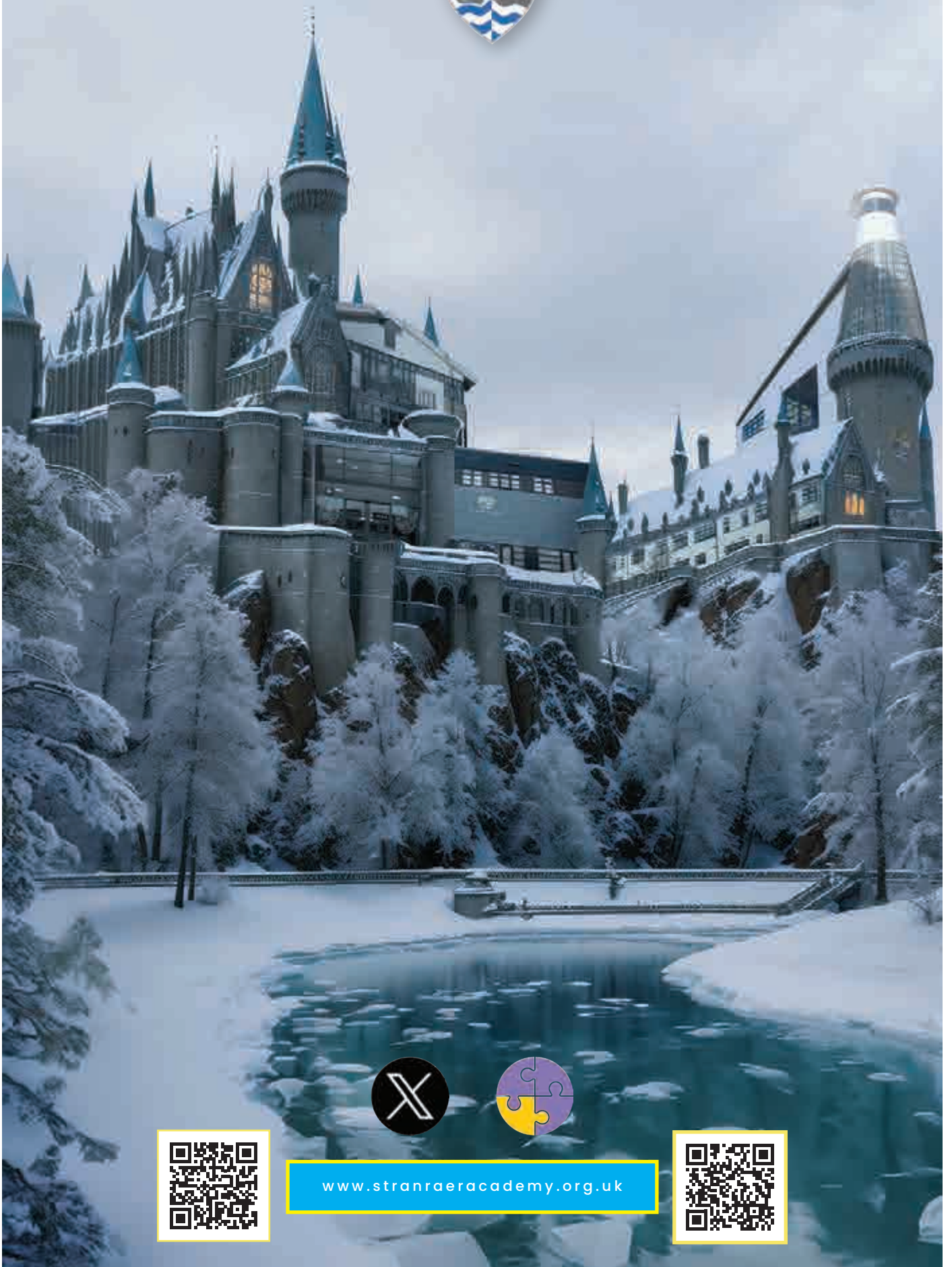
