




S3 BGE Practical woodworking students applied their creativity and artistic skills to personalise their own small stool, while demonstrating level 4 practical skills.

EMMA: Surely you don't believe in that nonsense?

(The school bell rings - Beep, beep, beep, EVERYONE exits separate ways.)

act 1, scene 2

(The school library. HAZEL, DAPHNE, EMMA, COMNIE, and OLIVIA are browsing a bookshelf.)

CONNIE: (Gleefully) What luck that all our English teachers sent us to the library at the same time!

DAPHNE: Mrs Parker looks perturbed. I hope something ghastly hasn't occurred.

OLIVIA: I told you before that everything is not alright. No one has witnessed any activity from the Loch Ryan witches in the last 154 years!

HAZEL: Perhaps we should ask James. He might know something helpful.

EMMA: (Teasingly) Choosing James over us, I see.

OLIVIA: We aren't meant to be prattling - we are supposed to be reading our library books.

DAPHNE: And who cares about that?

OLIVIA: (Indignantly) Me!

CONNI€: Ugghh.

(CONNIE walks absentmindedly into a rotten, dusty bookcase. She knocks a thick, leather book down. All the group begin coughing at the amount of dust.)

CONNIE: What is this? (Reading the title) 'Whispers of the Loch Ryan Witches!'

EMMA: Actually, that could provide us with valuable information about the witches! (Sceptical) If there were any witches.

OLIVIA: Here, pass me the book.

(CONNIE passes the book. OLIVIA burrows her head in the book.)

It states that in 1871 the witches had total control over Strangaer.

HAZEL: Really?

OLIVIA: After John McCulloch overthrew them in the second half of 1871, he concealed the witches under the oyster seabed, never to terrorize Stranraer again.

DAPHNE: Then, how did they escape their prison under the seabed?

HAZEL: (Thoughtfully) Hmmm. I have a theory. Hundreds of oysters were collected yesterday. What if the witches were disturbed and managed to break free! Supposing, the witches did freeze the shield.

OLIVIA: (Interrupting) Look at this! It says here that Malice, Frostine, and Gloom have a weakness.

CONNIE: (Leaning in) What is it? We could use it against them.

DAPHNE: Let's not get ahead of ourselves. We don't have any proof that is was the witches -

MALICE: (Offstage) (self-aggrandizing) It was us! We are the culprits of freezing your shield! The most fearsome, powerful, cunning witches of Loch Ryan!

(Dun. dun. dun!)

(This speech injects fear in everyone's hearts. The 51's huddle together and whisper nervously. The lights flicker out and the stage is plunged into darkness.)

(The sports pitch. Everyone is in P.E kits looking glum even though it is a glorious day. No physical activity is kappening.)

CONNIE: (Moaning) Tell me again why Illr Bartholomew didn't cancel sports day! We got yesterday afternoon off. Why not today as well!

DAPHNE: (Shivering) Is it just me or has it gotten exceedingly chilly?

HAZEL: Don't be - oh!

(It begins to pour with rain. The wind begins to howl, and the sky blackens. The stage is only lit with a grey light. The three witches appear on broomsticks.)

FROSTINE: (Cackling) This sports day will go our way!

GLOOM: (Smirking) Prepare for a blizzard of chaos!

(The stage erupts in pandemonium as it begins snowing. Steam engulfs the stage. The witches are swooping in and out of the crowd on their broomsticks, everyone they touch freeze. CONNI€: Remember the counterspell!


EVERYONE (Who isn't frozen.): (Holding hands)

BATTLEFIELDS ARTICLE BY GILL BONE

A group of \$3 pupils recently embarked poignant on a educational and journey to Belgium, exploring battlefields where many young soldiers fought and fell during World War I. Their trip was more than a history lesson-it was heartfelt tribute to bravery and sacrifice of those who came before particularly them. the young men from Stranraer who never returned home.

Thevisittookthemto sites such as Ypres and Passchendaele, each a solemn reminder of the brutal conditions

faced by soldiers in the trenches. At Tyne Cot Cemetery, **laraest** the Commonwealth war cemetery, students reflected on the sheer scale of the loss. The Menin Gate in inscribed Ypres, with the names thousands fallen soldiers with known grave, held particular significance. As the haunting Last Post echoed through the memorial, the students stood in silence, thinking of the young men from their own hometown who made the ultimate sacrifice.

One such name from Stranraer is Private John McDowall, a local lad who joined the King's Own Scottish Borderers and died in the Battle of Passchendaele in 1917. Alongside him were many others, ordinary young men who left behind families, dreams, and futures. The students were deeply moved as they traced the stories of these soldiers, seeing the trenches and landscapes that shaped their final days.

The trip not only deepened their understanding of history but also instilled a profound sense of gratitude and remembrance. This annual trip will always ensure that their sacrifices will never be forgotten and that the pupils of Stranraer Academy "will remember them".


Lives Partnership, Change Mental Health, The Coronation Day Centre, Home Start and MND Scotland.

We're already looking forward to next year!











For the first time at Stranraer Academy, students have successfully passed the National Progression Award (NPA) in Visual Communication, marking a significant achievement both for the learners and the course itself. This milestone reflects their dedication to mastering a curriculum that bridges Art and Design with Graphic Communication, while also introducing foundational photography skills. Students have worked incredibly hard across the year to build a portfolio of digital work made entirely using Digital Technologies in the Creative Arts Faculty. Students have received SQA Certification for their practices.

Through the course's three carefully developed mandatory units, students gained a strong understanding of the graphic design process as it applies within the Scottish Creative Industries. With a particular emphasis on concept development and meeting client needs in line with industrystandard practice, learners were challenged to think critically, create purposefully, and communicate visually. Each unit, students were provided with a 'creative brief', which outlined their tasks to complete, and in the final unit of the course students were given minimal support, leading their own learning journey in order to meet the needs of the client in their own personal and professional way.

Passing this course not only validates their creative and technical growth, but also opens doors to future opportunities in Visual Communication, Graphic Design, Illustration, UI/ UX Design, Video Games Development, Animation, and beyond. Achievement of this course could lead students to a future pathway at Dumfries and Galloway Colelge. As the first cohort to complete the NPA in Visual Communication, these students have set a strong example for future learners, proving that with curiosity, resilience, and vision, an alternative creative pathway can become a foundation for meaningful progress. It's also important to note special recognition to our Classroom Assistant Mrs Fiona McColm, whose dedication to supporting students went above and beyond- so much so that Mrs McColm has completed the qualification with the rest of the class and has received her NPA Certificate from the SOA! Further congratulations are expressed to Taylor Strang who received an award for his commitment to the course as well as achieving the WBS Signs Graphic Design Award, Megan Jamieson who received an award for academic excellence, and Conar Ogston in recognition of his continued practice and development in Visual Communication.



INTRODUCING NEW PATHWAYS



S2 PUPILS TAKE ON ENGINEERING CHALLENGES

Our S2 pupils had a blast getting hands-on with engineering in two exciting activities, organised by FEMeng -**Empowering** Women in **Engineering from** the University of Glasgow's School of Engineering as part of their Ask An Engineer outreach project. First up, paper plane launchers – pupils built and tested their own launchers to see how far their planes could fly. They discovered how things like thrust, lift, and drag affect flight, just like in real aviation. There were plenty of epic launches (and a few crash landings)!

Next, we stepped into the world of sports shoe design. Pupils experimented with different materials to create the best shockabsorbing soles for running shoes. They learned how engineers make trainers comfy, durable, and perfect for athletes. Some designs were seriously impressive! It was a fun-filled morning packed with creativity, teamwork, and problemsolving, thanks to the efforts of the FEMeng team. Who knows, maybe we have some future engineers in the making!

HANDS-ON SCIENCE BEYOND THE CLASSROOM

Outdoor Learning in Science: Forces & Chemistry

Exploring science outdoors offers students hands-on experiences that reinforce key concepts in physics and chemistry.

Forces, Flight, Motion & Balanced Forces

Outdoor activities provide tangible ways to understand forces in action. For instance:

Flight: Using straw hoop gliders instead of paper planes demonstrates

principles of thrust, drag, lift, and gravity. Students can test different designs to explore aerodynamics.

Motion & Balanced Forces: Activities like tug-of-war or rolling objects on various surfaces highlight friction, inertia, and Newton's Laws of Motion. Observing how objects move—or stay still—provides real-world understanding of balanced and unbalanced forces.

Chemistry: Drawing Molecules

In chemistry, outdoor learning can involve visualizing molecular

structures with natural materials or chalk drawings. Students can:

Use sticks and clay to model covalent bonding between atoms, reinforcing molecular geometry.

Draw molecular structures on the ground to grasp how atoms connect in different compounds.

Investigate real-world chemistry, such as observing plant respiration or water properties, connecting structural formulas to practical application.

SAMPLING TECHNIQUES IN ECOLOGY

Fieldwork with the Support Learning Students: Sampling Techniques in Ecology

Outdoor investigations help students develop scientific inquiry skills through sampling techniques like pitfall traps and tree measurements.

Pitfall Traps: Used to sample ground-dwelling invertebrates, these small containers are placed flush with the soil surface and left for a period to collect species moving across the ground.

Measuring Trees: Students can assess tree growth and forest health by measuring tree height

These methods allow students to engage in real-world ecological research, improving observational and analytical skills in an outdoor setting.



Within the humming heart of the science department, a mechanical marvel has taken form. Under the guidance of Mr Cameron, the second battle bot has come to life—piece by engineered piece—crafted through dedication, curiosity, and no small amount of scientific wonder.

Week after week, through the glow of lunch hour lights, students have soldered wires, calibrated components, and harnessed the magic of radio waves. Guided by 3D-printed blueprints and steady hands, they've learned to wield tools both digital and manual, merging oldworld craftsmanship with the technologies of tomorrow.

The result? Not just one, but two fully operational battle bots—twin titans of the classroom arena, ready to spar, to learn, and to inspire. With each clash, students study the physics of impact, the art of design iteration, and the quiet thrill of discovery.

This work would not have been possible without the generous sponsorship of Stranraer Academy and Ecogen, whose belief in student innovation powers every circuit. A special thanks also goes to Mr Patterson in CDT, whose support helped bring these bots to life.



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
